

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

Mordecai-the-Jew


Can you see what these two bad men are doing? A dreadful thing! They are planning to murder the mighty King of Persia, King Ahasuerus.





We wonder what Mordecai felt. We know one thing: he had a wonderful secret. I wonder what it was?


Haman, the King's Favourite
