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People Jesus Met

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John the Baptist

Crowds of people were going out into the wilderness. See them leaving their homes. Some were coming from the great city of Jerusalem. Some were coming from the little towns. Some were bad, unkind people. Some were people who thought they were good. Some were soldiers. There were all sorts of people.

The only thing he could find to eat was honey (which the bees made in the rocks) and little flying creatures called locusts (which he caught).

But John was a good man. He was a man of God. And as he preached the people listened. He told them they were sinful. He told them God was angry and

that they needed to repent – to be sorry for their sins and to leave them. All of us need to repent. May we ask God to give us repentance.

Now watch what John is doing! See him taking these people out into the River Jordan (which flowed nearby) and dipping them underneath the water. He is baptizing them. Not everybody! Only those who were really sorry for their sins.

Then one day the Lord Jesus Himself came to see John. He too asked John to baptize Him. At first John said "No"; he was not good enough to baptize Jesus his Lord and Master. And he could not understand why Jesus wanted to be baptized; He was not a sinner. But then John did as Jesus asked him.

But now what wonderful things happened! As John was lifting up the Lord out of the water, a beautiful dove came down and lighted on His head. It was not an ordinary dove. It was the Holy Spirit coming from heaven like a dove. And then a voice could be heard speaking from heaven – the voice of God the Father. It said, "This is My beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased."



What a surprise she got! Jesus said, "I am He."


Really the Lord Jesus made Himself known to this poor, sinful woman more clearly than to anyone else He met. What must she have felt?

We wonder why he asked Jesus to his house. Well, we do not know. But we know that when Jesus arrived, he did not treat Him very kindly. In Bible days, if a person came to your house, you always washed his feet with water (people's feet got very hot and dusty) – but Simon did not.

Anyway, the meal began. They started to eat and talk. But who is this? And what is she doing? She is a woman everyone knows; she has been a very bad woman. However did she get in?

But watch her! She is crying – she feels so sorry about the bad things she has done – and she cries so much that her tears fall on Jesus' feet. Now she bends down and begins to dry them with her long hair. Now she is kissing them. How much she must love the Lord Jesus! But now she is pouring beautifully smelling ointment over His feet to cool and refresh them.

Simon watched with amazement. But he was not very pleased. He also began to think some very unkind thoughts. He thought, "Everyone says Jesus is a prophet. He can't be – or He would have known who this woman is. She is a sinner."

Now Jesus knew everything Simon was thinking. Did you know that He knows everything that you think? No one else can know, but Jesus does.

Then Jesus told a little story. Once there was a man with a lot of money. He lent some of it to two different people; they would have to give it back to him. But to one he gave 50 pennies and to the other ten times as much, 500 pennies.

When the time came for them to give him his money back, they couldn't. They had spent it. They had not one penny left. Now they could have been sent to prison, couldn't they? But the man was very, very kind. He said, "I will let you off." They must have been very, very glad. What a nice story!

But then Jesus turned to Simon. He asked him a question, "Simon, which of these two do you think would love the man most?"

It was an easy question. Of course, the man who had been let off the 500 pennies he owed. Quickly Simon answered.

But why was Jesus telling this little story? Simon soon knew.

Jesus turned and said, "Simon, you never washed

My feet. This woman has washed them with her tears, and wiped them with her long hair. You never kissed Me. This woman kissed My feet. You didn't anoint My head with ointment; this woman has anointed My feet. That is why I told the story. She has had many, many sins forgiven – so she loves Me very, very much."

Only Jesus can forgive sins. So He said to the woman, "Thy sins are forgiven." How happy she must have been! She went away with her heart full of peace – a loving follower of the Lord Jesus.

You can read this story in Luke chapter 7, verses 36 to 50.

We too need forgiving. And no one can forgive us but the Lord Jesus. There is a beautiful word: "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness."
